4. Identify resources, as necessary, to dedicate to the planning of the shared measurement system
(including, but not limited to, staff for meetings, meeting space, and review of documents), and
5. Participate in the selection of the vendor and collaborate with the selected vendor to develop
specific shared outcomes and a shared measurement system that links to our current computerized
system(s).
