<p>Updates</p>	<p>Shared Outcomes Measurement.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Listed on the slide is the work we are doing currently. • Our goal is to find a shared metric that can be used across local organizations. For example, Health Action, Cradle to Career and Economic Development. • We have met with Steve Trippe and the evaluator of Measure O. • We have plans to start a County-wide research institute that would coordinate evaluations and data sharing. We anticipate needing \$2 million dollars in initial funding. We will pursue the initial funding through federal channels, foundations and human services discretionary grant funding. <i>The Center for Effective Change</i> was suggested as a name for the institute. • A study by Dr. Tony Iton analyzing how and why communities fail was discussed as a valuable literary source to review. 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	<p>stop funding fights. We would like to promote a shift in thinking from single focus funding to shared funding. However will be cautious not to undermine other programs in the process. It could be helpful to offer sessions that addressed competitive vs. shared funding.</p> <p>READY</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • READY will provide a centralized data collection method to capture risk factors and outcomes for children receiving early childhood education throughout Sonoma County. The information will be collected and reported by individuals early childhood educators. These educators will receive technical assistance about how to accurately collect and report information about each child. Reports about their children and their outcomes will be provided to each participating early childhood educator. Based on their outcomes, providers will receive training and coaching to improve their outcomes. • READY will raise community knowledge of the importance of early childhood education. Studies show that access to Early Childhood Education has the potential to decrease special education costs, decrease after school intervention and improve language development. • READY’s next steps will include focus groups with early childhood education providers, parents, teachers and SSU/JC faculty. There will be community conversations in 5 districts. The next phase of work will be finalized at First 5 Early Childhood Education Committee in October. • READY is a preliminary evaluation for the research institute. <p>Portfolio Update</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • We have 59 programs involving 71 organizations. • We need to include AB114 programs. Joni Thacher and Caryn Henkel will verify their programs have been included. • The committee discussed the process for Tier 1, 2 and 3 renewals. How can we encourage Tier 1 and 2 programs to move up a tier? Tier 2 is a resting place for many programs. Can an organization remain at the Tier 3 level or do they have to move up? • Tier 1 isn’t a goal for all organizations. We need to leave room for innovation. • How do we measure success when success is reflected by the absence of reports? For example, the decrease in police reports as a positive outcome from the Mayor’s Gang Prevention Task Force. • The Petaluma People Services appeal was approved and their program was approved for 		

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	<p>Tier 2 status. The appeal process exists as an excellent mechanism from constructive dialogue.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The Policy Committee will continue to have quarterly meetings. You can bring guests, but it is critical to have department heads present. <p>Transition Plan</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Marla’s last day will be July 26, 2013. She will remain as a contracted thought partner. • The Board of Supervisors will discuss committee back-up in Efred Carrillo’s absence. <p>Branding</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Does the community know about Upstream? • Upstream and Health Action could have a joint meeting to “brand”. • Upstream is less about the name and more about the philosophy behind the name. The community should see our efforts to embrace collective impact, achieve shared measurement and promote mutually reinforcing activities. • We need to define the community we are trying to reach. The Human Services community knows about Upstream, but there are a lot of department heads that don’t. • The Taxpayers Association would be an excellent organization to share Upstream with. • We also need to continue to engage with the business community.
